- The awarding of ANI Prizes to outstanding graduates of RAN courses including at the Royal Australian Naval College, for Lieutenant Commander Leadership Development programs, Chief Petty Officer and Warrant Officer Development Courses, the Information Warfare PQ basic course and involvement in the Commodore Rupert Long Prize for the Naval Intelligence Officers Basic Course.
